But before we get ahead of ourselves or sidetracked with our request for anyone with a wringer washer needed for this summer's show, let's scroll back through our camera roll to where we were at the beginning of 2022. This year, we have found our way forward in relation to new realities. As our world began to thrum with activity after the hiatus of the pandemic, we began the year committed to activating relevance in our community through cross-cultural sharing and by supporting emergent artistic practice and professional development, creative residencies, inquiry-based research and innovative experimentation and creation, and robust presentations.

Courage in the face of many realities has been our teacher this year.

When do we know to stand together in solidarity?






STREAM: Science, Technology, Robotics, Electronics, Arts + Mathematics

STREAM is an inquiry-based, hands-on learning program for youth, ages 10 – 15, facilitated at the Comox Valley Art Gallery by educator Stew Savard.

The Comox Valley Art Gallery is committed to supporting youth in navigating their learning pathways at the intersection of art and technology — areas that have been historically patriarchal. STREAM Incubators emphasize access, diverse perspectives and ways of learning, rooted in relationship building and reciprocity.

The initial series of STREAM incubators began in 2021, inspired by the work of Deb Dumka and Claire Sanford. Their exhibition, *Our Young Girls*, was an interactive installation exploring gender + digital empowerment + access + technology + safe spaces + art.

In 2022, the group's explorations included EV3 and VEX V5 robotics, LEGO, and stop-motion animation.

In January 2020, Comox Valley Art Gallery initiated convergent programming that reflected memory, perceptions, experiences, and relationships with the water that surrounds and permeates everything in our world. The Covid-19 pandemic interrupted this programming. Two years later, we found ourselves living within an endemic and with a heightened awareness of the many difficult realities our world is faced with. Water seemed to be calling to us with an invitation to look deeply into what we might do in response.

In 2022, the Comox Valley Art Gallery 'returned to water'. The *RETURN TO WATER* convergent programs included creative residencies, a group exhibition, collaborations with community partners and education programs, incubator projects, cultural sharing, public space presentations, and performances that presented opportunities for engaging with the responses of artists and the community to these questions.

The interdisciplinary work in this exhibition emerged through a process of slowing down, listening, observing, and responding over time. The creative process of the artists was one of inquiry, site specific encounter, dialogue with place, letting go of expectations, giving materials their own agency, and allowing the unexpected to erupt. The gallery supported the collective's practice through curatorial collaboration, residencies, facilitating site-specific research and relationships with the Comox Valley community and K'ómoks Nation.









































RETURN TO WATER FESTIVAL May 10 – May 14, 2022

RETURN TO WATER included collaboration with community partners + education programs, research + creation activities, and events that engaged the community in considering and celebrating water. Throughout this convergent program, events were presented alongside the current exhibition that shared community partners and schools' research + creation + community engagement activities.

The Return To Water Festival was a series of arts-based events and presentations that brought community together to explore issues related to perceptions of water, use of water, the human relationship to water, the climate's effect on water, and the concept of water as a "living entity". Daily events instigated interdisciplinary and cross-cultural considerations of water and its significance through visual art, photography, video, sound, interactive media, texts, performance, music, dance, and song.

The community was invited to participate in a wide variety of activities throughout the festival week.

Students were invited to respond to a choice of themes, including "Return To Water" and "Emergent Forms of Togetherness", for a major class project.



Return to Water - Notes by Lyss Brush at Hand-in-Hand Nature Education

PAINTING WITH WATER / images 1-3 The children use paint brushes and buckets of seawater to "paint" large rocks on the beach.

"The water makes it darker and shiny... then it dries".

BUCKETS JOURNEY / images 1-3 Letting buckets travel down the stream to be retrieved from a tide pool.

The children began to see how far they might go, if they got stuck, and wondering why.

Everyone got involved and it was very exciting and wet!

"It sinks when it fills with water!"

"It's a boat!"

"It's going far!"

"They are floating away!"

"It won't float when it's full of stuff."

WET CHALK / images 1-3 Children use sidewalk chalk on wet pavement in the Filberg Park. They observe how it isn't dusty like usual.

"It's different than on dry. On wet the chalk is melty. It melts in."

"It's melting down into a darker colour."

One child began smudging and blending the chalk on the wet surface. Some of it was thick and turned pasty.

"It is like face paint! Look at it on my hands."

Other children join in blending their colours together.

Later, when the pavement was dry: "We can make dust! It isn't melty anymore."

CHOCOLATE MILK PUDDLE /images 1-3 Water play in mucky puddles using various containers, bottles, funnels, and sponges.



The Mark of Water

Date Observed: May 5th, 2022

A rainy Thursday afternoon set the perfect scene to continue the exploration of water through the use of a sensory, mixed media experience. The children had spent the day before standing on a ladder, using pipettes to drop various shades of blue and purple watercolour onto the canvas below mimicking the way raindrops fall. The other element that was included was canola oil. The children began to notice the ways that water and oil interact or rather do not want to interact with one another. They began to question why this might be, creating theories that were waiting to be explored.


As the educators explored ways we could further this investigation, we turned to the classroom resources. The resource most fitting was Michaela Goade's story "We are Water Protectors" which tells the story of a "young water protector [taking] the stand to defend Earth's most sacred resource" from the black snake, more commonly known as a pipeline. (Goade, 2020). This story connected the experience of "It's A Whirlpoo noticing what happens when oil and water interact to bigger



concepts of the world. We were curious about how the Black Snake could affect the water and what it means to be a water protector who helps keep the water safe.



The addition of natural elements were brought in the next day as the children went out and collected traces of the earth to add to this collaborative art piece. Connections were made to the many discussions that were had in the classroom as the children noticed the different ways their art represented aspects of the









Making connections

We deepen our understanding as educators by connecting this moment to the BC Early Learning Framework, choosing the living inquiry: "Identities, social responsibility and diversity." We looked at and further connected this moment to the pathway "Inter-relationships of humans and natural environments" where we have begun to teach the children how interconnected we are with the natural world - mutually depending on one another. I myself began to question "What practices do I cultivate that enrich and deepen children's relationship with place, land, and the creatures and forms within it.?" (P.90) as we have



demonstrated through this mixed media process-based activity. As we continue to go through our day we will take moments like these as they come, remaining immersed and emergent in the opportunities to create relationships with the living and breathing world around us.




















The Comox Valley Art Gallery continued its place-based programming, moving it's focus on water to the presentation of the land/lens/text-based practice of artist Marlene Creates. When writing about her four decades of creative interest in place, Creates talks about her work as intentionally "simple gesture[s] that left no permanent mark" and are "non-monumental interventions in deliberate opposition to large-scale earthworks." (1) The artist's evolving process over her years of practice has been one of going outside to be on the land and to encounter a place through physical experience – lying down, sleeping, interacting, listening to the land and those who live there. Drawing on these phenomenological encounters, Creates has structured images and words to communicate her experiences through photographs, hand drawn maps, tracings, text, and performative acts. In these ways, the artist offers an opportunity for "seeing" places with a new perspective. (2)

During her time in the Comox Valley, Marlene Creates undertook an artist residency, engaged with local schools and the wider community through artist talks + artist led activities, and was present for the opening of a solo exhibition of her work.

In 2002, artist Marlene Creates moved to Blast Hole Pond Road, Portugal Cove, Newfoundland and Labrador. There, in her new home, the hours in a day, the weeks, and the months flowed into 20 years during which Creates's "principle artistic venture has been to pay close attention to one particular place — "six acres of boreal forest where I live." Creates's research — curiosity, observation, kinaesthetic experience, and collaborative + experimental processes with the workings of nature — are part of a multi- disciplinary creative process that has been described as active and formal inquiry, as well as receptive and meditative. She has been present to one place, walking its paths, pausing, and "stepping away" to deepen her relational dialogue with the land she lives within.

Through photo-based work, mapping, and text, the exhibition shared the phenomenological experiences that span the years that Marlene Creates has lived in one place.






































NINA WEDBURG THULIN: THE SOURCE

CREATIVE RESIDENCY | COLLABORATIONS: January 17 – February 24, 2023

During her residency for *The Source* project installation, artist Nina Wedberg Thulin carried all her "questions from former works" while becoming "a beginner starting from zero". Nina was housed at the gallery's residence, CVAG Next Door, while she engaged with the community and developed new place-responsive work. Nina visited North Island College to collaborate with Sculpture + Integrated Practices students in production for an installation at the Comox Valley Art Gallery.

INSTALLATION PRESENTATION: February 24 – April 1

The Source incorporated new work developed in response to her encounters of the outdoor spaces around the gallery, as well as work that travelled with the artist from Stockholm, Sweden. In her artist talk, Nina spoke about the night time vacant and winter-dark streets, those who are unhoused taking shelter in alcove spaces, and of the wild rabbits foraging for food in the urban terrain.





THEME 2: Stories Without Words / Under Cover Material exploration: open 3D + integrated media combination Methodology: juxtaposition of content + form


































AS THE WIND BLEW: THE GROUND BENEATH ME | AT THE WATER'S EDGE | IN ITS PATH



























COASTAL CAMERA OBSCURA III | Donald Lawrence
































WALK WITH ME

2020 - ongoing

STORY WALKS | COMMUNITY ACTION + RESEARCH

Walk With Me is an arts-based community action project that seeks to uncover the human dimensions of the toxic drug poisoning crisis as it has unfolded locally. Within and through it, a group of artist-researchers, front-line workers, and people with lived and living experience have banded together in a spirit of solidarity, attempting to come to terms with the impact of the crisis on individuals and community groups through a practice of story sharing.

Story Walks are guided audio journeys that bring participants through various outdoor "reflective spaces". Communities and groups are invited to walk and listen, and to sit together — responding to the stories in a sharing circle. Through this process, communities are encouraged to find connectedness with the people and places at the heart of the toxic drug poisoning crisis.
























YOUTH MEDIA PROJECT

2012 – ongoing

The Comox Valley Art Gallery's Youth Media Project uses digital media, creative facilitation, and artistic collaboration as a framework for youth to create media for community action. Those who come through the program end up creating long-lasting connections not just with each other, but with other community members and organizations in the Comox Valley.

The Youth Media Project provides intensive hands-on training in video production, sound design, and other media skills. This program is open to anyone from the ages of 16 to 30 who is interested in learning how to create videos that tell stories and inspire community discourse. We recruit five participants per 13 week session.


Participants create two films: one independent film that speaks to what they would like to see done better in our community, and one film in collaboration with a small business or community organization that celebrates the sustainable work that is being done in the Valley.
